Town Clean-Up Days October 7 and 8

The New Castle Public Works Department will once again hold the annual town clean-up days on Friday, October 7 and Saturday, October 8 from 8:00 am - 3:00 pm at the Public Works facility at the west end of town (801 West Main Street). This event is for New Castle residents only and everyone must show proof of residence to enter the Public Works yard.

The clean-up days offer the opportunity to get rid of items that aren't included with regular trash services. Large items like furniture are acceptable, as are appliances. Refrigerators, however, must be empty of all food items. If they are not empty, they won't be accepted.

Electronic items, including televisions, laptops, computers, etc. will be accepted. However, because of new state regulations, paints, stains and chemicals aren't acceptable. Finally, only 4 tires per household can be accepted.

Living With Bears



Photos of bears appear frequently on Facebook, reminding us that there are a lot of them in town this year. We all know that they are here looking for food in preparation for hibernation. Letting them become accustomed to foraging near people, however, puts both them and us at risk. Mother bears with cubs are dangerous, and CPW has reported at least one abandoned cub. If you're concerned about a bear, report it to the New Castle Police or Colorado Parks and Wildlife.

The Roaring Fork Bear Coalition has provided a useful list of ways to avoid attracting bears. Visit them at Roaringforkbears.org.

- Never feed or approach bears.
- Keep trash and recyclables in a garage or other indoor area or else use in bear-resistant containers. Only put trash outdoors on the morning of pick-up.
- Remove your bird feeders when bears are active.
- Never leave pet food outdoors.
- Secure chicken coops, beehives, and livestock with electric fencing.
- Clean BBQ grills & grease traps with ammonia, bleach or degreasing agent and store grills in a secure area.
- Pick fruit from trees and clean up fallen fruit.
- Keep your dog on-leash. Off-leash dogs are the cause of many negative encounters between people and bears.
- Keep all bear-accessible windows closed and locked
- Lock your vehicle and garage doors. Never leave food or trash inside car

If bears are rewarded with food at your home, bears will keep coming back!

From the New Castle Garden Club:

Divide and Conquer! It's time to double or triple your perennials by splitting them, a process that's necessary every two or three years in order to assure continued blooms. Dig up clumps of daylilies, alliums, catmint, bearded and Siberian iris, oriental poppies, phlox, bleeding hearts, hosta and veronica, all of which split well. Gently divide into two or three parts and plant them immediately in their new locations with good soil; water regularly until frost hits. Efforts this fall will bring new growth in the spring.

Also in the fall, cut back iris leaves, daisies, catmint and winecups (aka poppy mallows). On the other hand, don't cut back hot pokers, mums, or hyssop until spring. Leaving tall ornamental grasses until spring will provide visual interest through the winter and protect their crowns.

Remove spent annuals from pots and bring the pots into the garage, shed or other indoor space. Use the pots to start plants from the seeds you saved from poppies, columbines, black-eyed Susans, penstemons, snapdragons, blue flax, cornflowers and coreopsis. Scatter the seeds into separate pots, mix the topsoil a little and add some moisture and light. You can also let these perennial blooming plants re-seed themselves right where they fall; just remember not to pull up the new growth in the spring thinking they are weeds. Garden club members recommend collecting dried seeds and sharing or trading them with neighbors.

Tuesday, November 8, 2022 is Election Day. Ballots will be mailed to registered voters beginning October 17. A 58-cent stamp will be required to return a ballot by mail (and only one ballot may be included in a return envelope!) Ballots should be mailed no later than November 1.

There are secure 24/7 ballot drop boxes throughout the county. New Castle's is in front of Town Hall. On Election Day ballots may be cast in person at the New Castle Library from 7 am to 7 pm.
