### **Recycling in New Castle**

The Climate and Environment Commission met recently with representatives of Mountain Waste and Recycling to learn about recycling efforts in the Town. Mike Hinkley and Doug Goldsmith noted that New Castle recycles 16% of its waste materials, ahead of the state's 15% average. They also cleared up a common misconception about the way they pick up recycling.

Normally the garbage headed to the landfill is picked up first. If the collectors see a recycle bin contaminated with garbage, they will add the contents to their truck. A second truck, which collects the contents of recycle bins, looks just like the regular garbage truck. These trucks can compact materials, letting them hold more, thus reducing the number of trips between New Castle and the sorting facility in

Carbondale.



According to Mountain Waste, plastic water bottles are among the few recyclables which actually have monetary value. They can be used in the manufacture of t-shirts, sweaters, fleece jackets, even lining for sleeping bags. While the Town encourages everyone to use reusable bottles full of good-tasting New Castle water, all single-use plastic bottles need to be recycled.

On the other hand, plastic bags (like those from City Market) are not recyclable. They can clog the machine used to sort recyclables. Return plastic bags to the bin at City Market.

### **February is New Castle History Month**

In 2015, the Town Council proclaimed February to be New Castle History month, and ordered an annual celebration of our history each February. From 2015 through 2020, that celebration has been a community potluck lunch, featuring food that would have been familiar to earlier residents of New Castle. Historic presentations at these luncheons recognized the contributions of the Rippy, Jolley, Mattivi and Ganley families, and last year we heard from members of the Historical Society.

Covid-19 restrictions have, of course, required the cancellation of this year's luncheon. Instead, the Recreation Department has created a collage of historic photos and documents. Everyone is invited to come to the Community Center to view the collage, 9 am to 4 pm.

### **Snowman Entries Due Feb. 28**

January has been unusually snow-free. That's great for commuters. Unfortunately it's bad for the snow pack, with the upper Colorado River basin hovering around 70% of average. It's also bad for New Castle's second annual snowperson contest.

### **Restoring the Canyon**

### Free Covid-19 testing in New Castle

Mobile Covid-19 testing stations are being provided by Curative at sites around the country. Western Colorado is fortunate to have five such testing sites, including one in New Castle. Curative collects samples for testing (by appointment only) every Sunday from 9 am to 3 pm at Elk Creek Elementary School. There are 350 appointment times available each Sunday.

The website https://curative.com provides information about the company and the procedure for testing. It is also the site to use to make an appointment for a test. Curative will bill insurance companies or the federal government, so there is no cost to patients.

### Covid-19 vaccines

Information about Covid-19 vaccines, much like other information about the disease, changes week by week (and sometimes day by day).

Here's what we know for sure: There are two FDA-approved vaccines in production, and a third is being field-tested. People in the Colorado's 1A category include doctors, nurses, nursing home residents and employees and others providing high-risk essential services. These people are getting their vaccines through their places of employment.

Residents who are 70 years old or older are also a high priority for vaccination. Currently in Garfield County, Valley View Hospital and Grand River Health have the responsibility for vaccinating seniors. The hospitals began a waiting list, but put it on hiatus when vaccine deliveries were much smaller than anticipated. At press time, both sites were taking new appointments as they receive vaccines. ### It's Time for Licenses

All business and contractor licenses are renewable at the beginning of January. Anyone who has not yet renewed their license should do so as soon as possible. Dog licenses also need to be renewed. ### **Changes in Utility Rates**

The utilities bill included with this newsletter reflects the 3% annual rate adjustment which was effective with the new year. In 2018 the Town Council was faced with imposing a significant fee increase to help meet the increased cost of producing clean water and processing waste. At that time they decided to introduce an automatic 3% annual increase, hoping to avoid large jumps in the future.
