### Thank You, New Castle. Together We Have Come a Long Way!

Hats off to you New Castle. You have done an amazing job. A full year after wearing masks and staying at home became the new normal, the news about Covid-19 has started looking up. Vaccines are increasingly available. There are fewer hospitalizations and deaths both locally and state-wide. Garfield County has moved up to Level Blue (Caution) on the state Covid dial. Some summer events are being scheduled. Restaurants and other businesses are seeing much-needed relaxations of operational guidelines. Businesses are reporting excellent compliance with mandated COVID mask wearing and social distancing rules.

While the news continues to improve, the State Health Department still stresses the importance of not letting our guard down. They caution everyone to continue taking all precautions: continuing to wear masks, practicing physical distancing, washing hands frequently and limiting gatherings and get

your vaccines when you are eligible.

"There is hope on the horizon, and soon vaccines will be widely available to anyone who wants one. We need everyone to continue to adhere to public health protocols until then, and until we know more about the level of immunity the vaccine provides and for how long," said Eric France, chief medical officer, CDPHE. "We have all the tools available to us to avoid a spring wave— a growing supply of vaccines, public health orders that allow us to operate more safely, and protocols that protect us every day— let's use them."

There is a difference between getting better and being better. Let's continue to work together and avoid the danger of being too confident too soon. After a full year of being careful, we can't allow our hard work to go to waste. Let's move to the finish line together!

### **Check Your Mailboxes for Town Survey**

The Town of New Castle will send a mailer this month with information about its budget and a short community survey. Survey responses will provide important feedback as the Town considers different options for its budget, including road maintenance and park projects. The Town Council and staff will use the information gathered—along with other public input—to prioritize ongoing investments and improvements for our community. # April is Child Abuse Prevention Month



River Bridge Regional Center will kick off April's National Child Abuse Prevention Month on April 3rd from 12 to 2 pm at the Garfield County Courthouse in Glenwood Springs. The non-profit will "plant" over 300 pinwheels on the courthouse lawn, one for each of the child victims that they provided services to in 2020.

Mayor Art Riddile will participate in the April 3 ceremony, which will include speeches from River Bridge Executive Director Blythe Chapman and others.

A pinwheel garden will also be planted outside Town Hall in New Castle for the month of April. Headquartered in Glenwood Springs, River Bridge provides a child-centered, multidisciplinary approach to the prevention, assessment, treatment and investigation of child abuse.

### **Western Slope Drought Continues**

While more snow will likely fall in April, New Castle is facing continuing drought. This past summer and fall were dry, which left the soil holding very little moisture. In the Flat Tops, the source of our water supply, much of the melting snowpack is going to be absorbed into the soil. We can expect less runoff into East Elk Creek.

Furthermore, Aspen Public Radio noted recently that some snow this winter, falling when temperatures were very low, held less moisture. That dry, fluffy snow was welcome for shovelers, but it added little moisture and didn't help improve drought conditions.

Even with some April snow, it's incumbent on us to prepare for another summer of drought. Look at the May newsletter for the first of several articles about wildfire prevention. This month the focus will be on water conservation.

Simply being conscious of the need to save water will lead to less wasteful practices. Here are a handful of water-saving tips:

Wash only full loads of laundry

Take showers instead of baths

Take shorter showers

Make sure sprinklers all hitting vegetation (not running into road)

Don't overwater

Only run dishwasher when full

Repair leaks immediately

Collect rainwater for use on plants (since 2016, Coloradans are allowed to use two rain barrels)

Reuse water. Instead of letting clean water go down the drain, capture it for indoor and outdoor watering.

Observe the town's summer watering rules: water every other day before 10 am or after 6 pm. See more hints on the Town web site (www.newcastlecolorado.org/utilities).

# Celebrate Arbor Day on April 30

In March, the Town Council proclaimed April 30 to be Arbor Day in the Town of New Castle, and urged residents to plant trees and to support efforts to protect trees and woodlands. Cub Scout troop 221 will hold an Arbor Day celebration at 1:00 on April 30. Parks Director Charlie Moore and the scouts will plant an Autumn Blaze Maple tree near the pond in Alder Park. Residents are encouraged to join the scouts to learn more about Arbor Day and the essential role trees play in reducing erosion, moderating temperatures, cleaning the air and providing wildlife habitat.

### **Send Me to Soccer Camp Contest**

Challenger International Soccer Camps return to New Castle June 14-18 at VIX Ranch Park. The staff of coaches from Europe, Brazil and the U.S. will teach a fun, technical, and tactical based curriculum.
