

Fire Restrictions Are in Effect

New Castle bans all fireworks and outdoor burning from April 1 to November 1 each year. The exceptional drought this year makes those restrictions vitally important. In June most of Garfield County, including the New Castle area, was designated "exceptional drought," the most severe classification.

New Castle code prohibits all fireworks, open fires, spark-producing engines, welding torches, explosive devices, and anything else that might produce a spark or flame. Tossing lit smoking materials from cars or tossing them on the ground is also prohibited. Another danger is a chain or other metal dragging from a vehicle. Sparks from dragging chains have been blamed for some recent wildfires.

In June Garfield County also applied fire restrictions. It is not safe to have a fire or to produce sparks anywhere in Western Colorado. Be safe and keep the rest of us safe.

You Ask, We Answer

Q. Why doesn't the Town install a roundabout instead of the traffic-snarling four-way stop?

A. Route 6 is a state highway, so the intersection at the north end of the bridge is under the control of CDOT. The Town has worked with CDOT and plans for a multi-million-dollar roundabout (along with improvements to the bridge and the I-70 on/off ramps) are complete. The project is shovel ready.

The roundabout project is high on the priority list for our CDOT district but has not yet been funded. The defeat of the recent state transportation tax proposal has pushed the timetable into the future.

A related question asked about repairing the potholes on the bridge. The answer again is that CDOT manages the bridge and nearby intersections. They will make repairs on their own schedule.

Q. Why isn't the Lakota Recreation Center pool open the public like it used to be?

A. The Lakota Recreation Center was originally owned and operated by the Lakota Canyon Ranch owners. In December of 2017, the Center was sold to the Lakota HOA. The HOA, made up of all Lakota residents, decided to restrict access to the residents, whose dues maintain and bear responsibility for the pool.

What's Happening in Town?

The Public Works department will supervise two major projects this summer that were made possible with funding from grants. The Federal Mineral Lease District has approved funds for the replacement of fencing behind Main Street. The project not only fixes a lot of broken fencing, but also will improve the appearance of the town from the highway. Some owners of property that backs up to the railroad tracks and highway have already made improvements, and others may join in to help beautify the town's back yard.

A second project was just recently approved by the CDOT Main Street Revitalization Program. It will fund the replacement of the guard rail along County Road 335. The guard rail provides a barrier between the road and Talbott Trail and will greatly improve safety for both pedestrians and motorists.

Did You Know That. . .

- July 2 marked the anniversary of the start of the Storm King Fire, which burned near town in July of 1994, killing 14 firefighters.
- The annual July 4th Freedom Celebration at Apple Tree was a production of the Talbott family. They have sold the Apple Tree Community and will no longer be hosting the celebration. The town is grateful to the Talbotts (and all their volunteer helpers) for all the years of music, food, games, fireworks and patriotic celebration.
- Earlier in 2021, Garfield Clean Energy sponsored Solarize Garfield County, offering reduced prices and significant rebates for solar panel installation. Twelve New Castle residents participated, tying with Carbondale for the most installations.
- Lift-Up will re-open its New Castle food pantry in the River Center on July 15.


Bear Sightings in Town

The New Castle Police Department provided this photo of a treed bear in early June. She was sighted near Shibui Apartments with her three cubs. Subsequently more residents reported sightings, including several at the other side of town, near 7th Street and Elk Creek. A large make bear was also reported.

Bears in residential areas are an increasing problem throughout our region. They do not normally attack humans, though this mother bear is going to protect her cubs. Dogs and cats, however, may be at risk, and children should be warned to avoid getting near a cute bear cub.

Frequent contact with humans and pets may lead to a bear being euthanized, so for the sake of the bears, everything that attracts them into town must be removed. Use bear-proof trash cans or else keep trash cans safely inside a closed garage until the morning of collection day. And as much as we might want to attract birds to our yards, bird seed is also attractive to bears. Take down bird feeders whenever there are bears in town. Pet food and anything else that might be tempting bear food also needs to be kept inside.

Please report bear sightings to Colorado Parks and Wildlife at (970) 947-2920. The New Castle Police Department does not handle routine sightings but may be contacted in an emergency.
