# **Council and Staff Preparing 2022 Budget**

The 2022 budget process is well underway. Staff presented the original draft budget to the Council on September 21. Since then, Council has held in three budget work sessions and continues to share its vision with staff while at the same time maintaining a balanced, fiscally responsible budget.

In the General Fund, the largest revenue sources are sales tax, property tax, highway use tax, building permits and the tobacco tax. Anticipated increases in these revenue streams are being used to adjust staffing levels as the Town continues to grow, also to keep employee salaries and benefits competitive with surrounding jurisdictions and to provide reliable vehicles and safety equipment for the police force. Additional goals are improving and maintaining parks, streets and sidewalks, providing recreation programs, staying current with technology upgrades and cyber security protection, supporting local groups that help to improve the quality of life In New Castle and providing grant match funding for capital projects.

Finally, the town's unassigned cash reserves have been increased from \$1.2 million to \$1.7 million, as recommended by the Colorado Department of Local Affairs (DOLA). This represents approximately five months of expenses and ensures that the Town will be prepared for unexpected revenue interruptions or unforeseen excessive expenses.

In the Utility Fund, the Town remains committed to properly funding quality services while also increasing the reserve funds in anticipation of future infrastructure needs. Despite recent operational cost increases, the budget covers its expenditure estimates and reaches its reserve fund goals with only minimal rate increases to residents. The recent addition of the Bulk Water Station has added revenue opportunities for bulk water sales to consumers both inside and outside of our service area.

The Conservation Trust Fund receives funding from the Colorado Lottery program that must be used for new conservation sites or recreational purposes on any public site. Budgeted uses for these funds in 2022 include park equipment and enhancements.

The final draft of the 2022 budget will be presented to Council at a work session on November 16, 2021, and will be adopted at the December 7, 2021 Council meeting.

# Ring the Bells for the Salvation Army

Beginning the day after Thanksgiving, the New Castle Lions will be ringing the bells in front of City Market as part of the Salvation Army's annual fund-raising appeal. All the funds raised are retained locally and go to support families with emergency needs.

As in past years, the Lions need additional volunteers in order to reach the maximize number of potential donors. Past volunteers have all reported that it is an enjoyable and rewarding experience.
