Trick-or-Treat New Castle returns for its third year, bigger and better than ever. It will all take place on Friday, October 27, from 3:00 to 5:00 pm. The event gives the whole family, young and old, a chance to dress up in their Halloween best and enjoy an afternoon of candy and free activities.

The fun will begin at Alpine Bank and the New Castle Plaza at 3:00 pm, then continue in downtown Main Street and Burning Mountain Park until 5:00 pm. Local businesses will be handing out candy and providing free activities. Look for a haunted house, a maze to navigate, a photo booth and hayrides on Main Street. Trick-or-Treat New Castle is intended to be an addition to the Halloween season, not a replacement. Everyone is encouraged to enjoy traditional trick-or-treating with their families on October 31.

The Chamber of Commerce plans to bring back the Spirit Walk once again on Saturday, October 21, from 6:30 pm - 9:00 pm at Highland Cemetery.

Residents are invited to come learn about New Castle's history and its famous and infamous former residents on this guided, twilight walk through Highland Cemetery. Tour guides will lead small groups through the cemetery with flashlights to visit actors portraying the spirits. The actors will tell the stories of their lives in New Castle.

Warm beverages and baked goods will be available.

New Castle's Annual Clean-Up Days October 6 and 7

New Castle Public Works will host the annual town Clean-Up Days on Friday, October 6, and Saturday, October 7 from 8:00 am until 3:00 pm at the Public Works yard, located at 801 W Main Street, across from Elk Creek Elementary School. This event is for residents within town boundaries, and proof of residency will be required (Driver's License, other ID, a utility bill or other mail).

Most items too large for trash cans can be disposed of during Clean-Up Days, including electronics, oil, batteries, empty refrigerators, yard brush, appliances and furniture. There is a limit of 4 tires per household. Paint, stains and chemicals cannot be accepted.

The Public Works crew asks that everyone exercise patience. There is a small number of staff working at the event, and there may be a wait at the Public Works yard.

Each year the River Center's Volunteer New Castle Committee recognizes a business, an organization and an individual for their outstanding contributions to the town. The recognition ceremony occurs on Friday night of the Burning Mountain Festival.

The Volunteer Organization of the Year for 2023 is the New Castle Dog Park committee. They were honored for identifying a need, developing a plan, generating enthusiasm, raising money and seeing the project through to completion. The Dog Park opened in August in VIX Ranch Park, and it has been greatly appreciated by local dogs and their owners.

The Volunteer Business of the year is Colorado Drifters. The downtown Coffee and Fly Shop was recognized for the events they bring to Main Street, such as the monthly Bike Cruise and Trivia Nights, their donations to local causes and the way their staff pitches in wherever needed. Noted in particular was Drifter's "Pay It Forward" board, where patrons can name a recipient for a paid-up item.

Kevin Hansen is the 2023 Volunteer of the Year. The owner of the New Castle Coffee Company is active in the Chamber of Commerce and the local beekeeper's organization. He has participated in the Climate and Environment Commission's Earth Day celebrations and serves as a Scoutmaster for the local Cub Scouts. The honorees all appeared in the Burning Mountain Parade on Saturday morning of the festival.

Mountain Waste & Recycling Sends Reminders for Trash Days

Here are a few guidelines to make sure your containers are emptied on their scheduled service day.

- Place containers curbside by 7:00 am.
- Containers should sit between the road and sidewalk, not impeding auto or pedestrian traffic.
- Leave 3 feet of clearance around each container.
- Recycling containers are for recyclables only; they will not be emptied if they contain trash.
- During the winter make sure the containers are placed in an accessible location free of snow and ice.
- Download the Mountain Waste & Recycling ap for service day reminders and holiday schedules.



Interstate 70 Intersection News

CDOT came to town in mid-September to repave the bridges that cross the railroad tracks, the highway and the river. They also repaved the eastbound on-ramp. For two days, traffic flow was interrupted, giving motorists a foretaste of closures they will face when roundabout construction finally begins next year.

Still on the books for this year is infrastructure work from Xcel and others which must precede roundabout construction.

From the Garden Club

The New Castle Garden Club welcomes new members and invites everyone who loves to garden to join them and become part of this active group.

The Garden Club takes on the "deadheading" of the hanging baskets on Main Street during the summer months. They also help the River Center with their community garden on 4th Street, and they plant and maintain flowers in Liberty Park. They have also participated in the Burning Mountain Festival parade. A particularly satisfying project was the proposal of the cosmos flower as the New Castle town flower. The cosmos is a long-lasting, colorful flower which thrives in our area. The club presented their proposal to the Town Council, which declared it to be the Official Town Flower.

The club also holds educational meetings (usually with a potluck meal) and enjoys field trips, such as to the Lavender Festival in Palisade or to the Betty Ford Garden in Vail. They have also visited the Highwater farm in Silt, where young adults learn how to grow food and prepare it for guests. (highwayfarm.org).

Evacuation Plan to be Published in October

As announced in the September newsletter, an Emergency Evacuation Plan for New Castle has been in preparation and is now complete.

Town staff has worked tirelessly over the last year to build the plan with the assistance of Garfield County Emergency Management and in collaboration with Colorado River Fire Rescue. The Evacuation Plan will be published on the town website (www.newcastlecolorado.org) and copies will be available mid-October in Town Hall.

All residents are urged to familiarize themselves with the plan and understand the steps to be taken in an emergency to better help not only themselves, but emergency personnel in the event of an evacuation.

Water Meter Reading Reminder

The August newsletter contained an article about a proposed change in the town's meter-reading schedule. With the new schedule, October's meter reading will be the last until April. Everyone will be billed the minimal base rate during the intervening months. Any overages will be billed in the spring, when meter reading resumes.

Under the new schedule, meters will be read in April, May, July, September, & October. The June and August bills will be estimated, with corrections made the following month if needed. The new schedule will allow the Public Works staff more time for other projects.

New Castle Flag Available

In June the Town Council adopted the New Castle Town Flag which was designed by Ed Mooney. Mooney displayed the flag in the Burning Mountain

Festival parade and soon it will be displayed at Town Hall. Mooney has ordered several flags which he is offering to residents for
